




#### A fond farewell to the Class of 2021

# An Cluainín (The Little Meadow)

Our school is situated in the immediate outskirts of Dublin City centre where green space is scarce, but wildlife still exists. In the Spring / Summer of 2020, as we all came to terms with a new reality of life with Covid-19 and limited our activities and movements, many stories made national and international headlines about nature reestablishing itself and making its presence known in the absence of human activity. This was also the case in Loreto Crumlin where we

recognised the opportunity for our students to (re)connect with nature. Our Transition Year students, working in collaboration with Trinity College Access Programme, chose a biodiversity related project as the focus of their student leadership pillar. This gave birth to *The Little Meadow (An Cluainín)*. With the help of Collie Ennis, (Zoology fellow in TCD), and the local Bloomin Crumlin group, we received fantastic guidance in the planning of this project, particularly the establishment of a pocket forest. They directed our students towards online resources and made practical suggestions that proved to be

resources and made practical suggestions that proved to be invaluable. Under the in-school guidance of Mr. Whelan, Mr. Larkin and our caretaker Alan McGovern, our TY students have established our meadow of wildflowers, a pocket forest and a pond. To date, we have seen fantastic growth on the meadow. The pocket forest is showing signs of life with many green shoots and is attracting a wide variety of insects, birds and even the resident foxes! The ponds have been populated with oxygenating plants and as Spring turns to Summer we hope to attract all sorts of flora and fauna to the meadow. Aisha achieved a phenomenal 2nd place in the Individual Speaker category and was richly deserving of this accolade. Erin debated superbly on the night as well, following on from her stellar performances last year.

On 27th March, the Hist. Girls' MACE debate took place, organised by the Historical Society in Trinity College, and held on Zoom. Loreto College entered one Team comprising of Ekenenna Chukwuewuzie and Zahra Benyala (both in 5th year). Both girls made it to the grand final and were awarded medals for this fantastic achievement. Motions they spoke on included: 'This House Would Ban Private Colleges' and 'This House Believes that the traditional school subjects are still the best subjects' and also 'This House Promotes environmental optimism rather than pessimism'.

The year ended on a high for Ekenenna also in public speaking. On May 26th, 5th year Ekenenna was crowned National Champion in the Senior Grand Final of the 'Speak Out Ireland' public speaking competition.
